



Mt Myohyang



A wonder of nature

One of the eight scenic spots in Korea, Mt Myohyang covers a vast area encompassing parts of Hyangsan County and the city of Huichon in Jagang Province and also of Nyongwon County in South Phyongan Province.

The area can be divided largely into Sinhyangsan (also called Naehyangsan) and Oehyangsan. It abounds in chains of peaks, mysteriously-shaped rocks, waterfalls and valleys. Among the famous valleys are Sangwon, Manphok, Chonthae and Chilsong.

Mt Myohyang is noted for the 80 000 Blocks of the Complete Collection of Buddhist Scriptures; the Pohyon Temple, a Buddhist building going back to the 11th century; and other historical relics—all showcasing the Korean nation's time-honoured history, culture and creativity.

Adding fame to the celebrated mountain is the International Friendship Exhibition House, which displays the gifts presented to President Kim Il Sung, Chairman Kim Jong Il and the respected Comrade Kim Jong Un by party and state leaders and people of different strata from all over the world.

It is home to 1 200-odd species of higher plants and 1 000-odd species of animals, including 130 species of birds and 32 species of wild animals—amphibians, reptiles, fishes, insects, etc.

Counting among the six celebrated mountains in Korea, it was registered as a world biosphere reserve in May Juche 98 (2009).





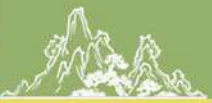

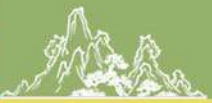

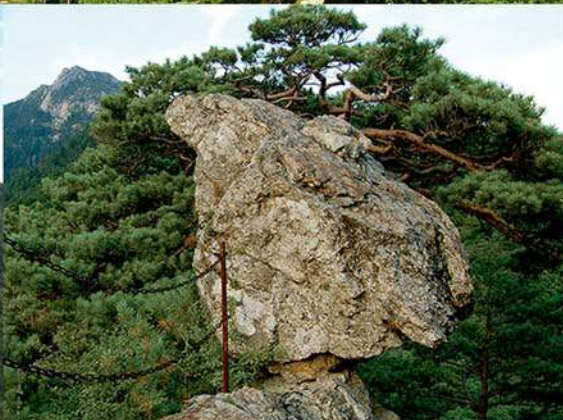

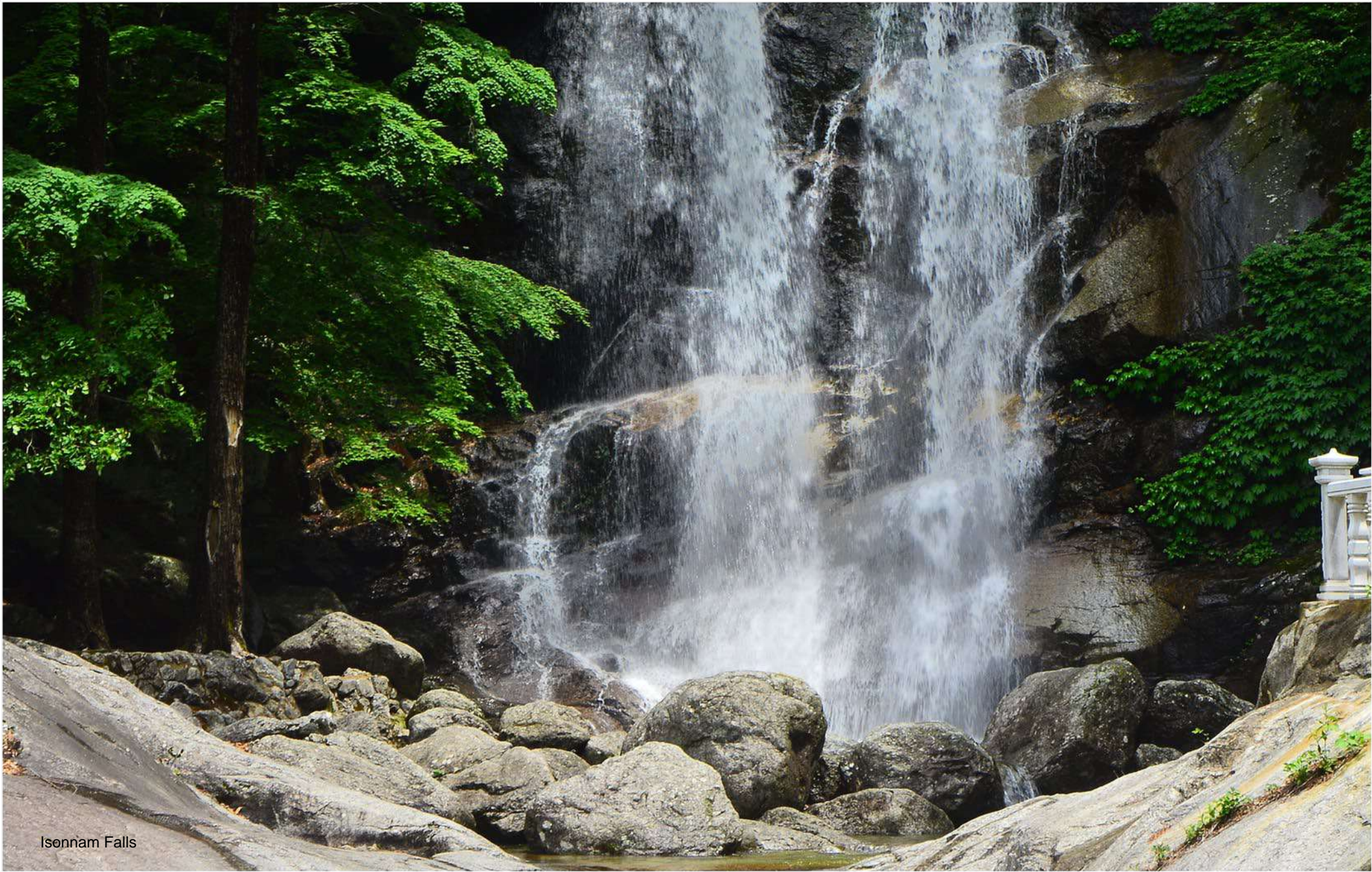
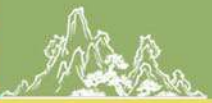

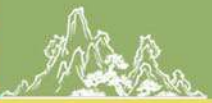

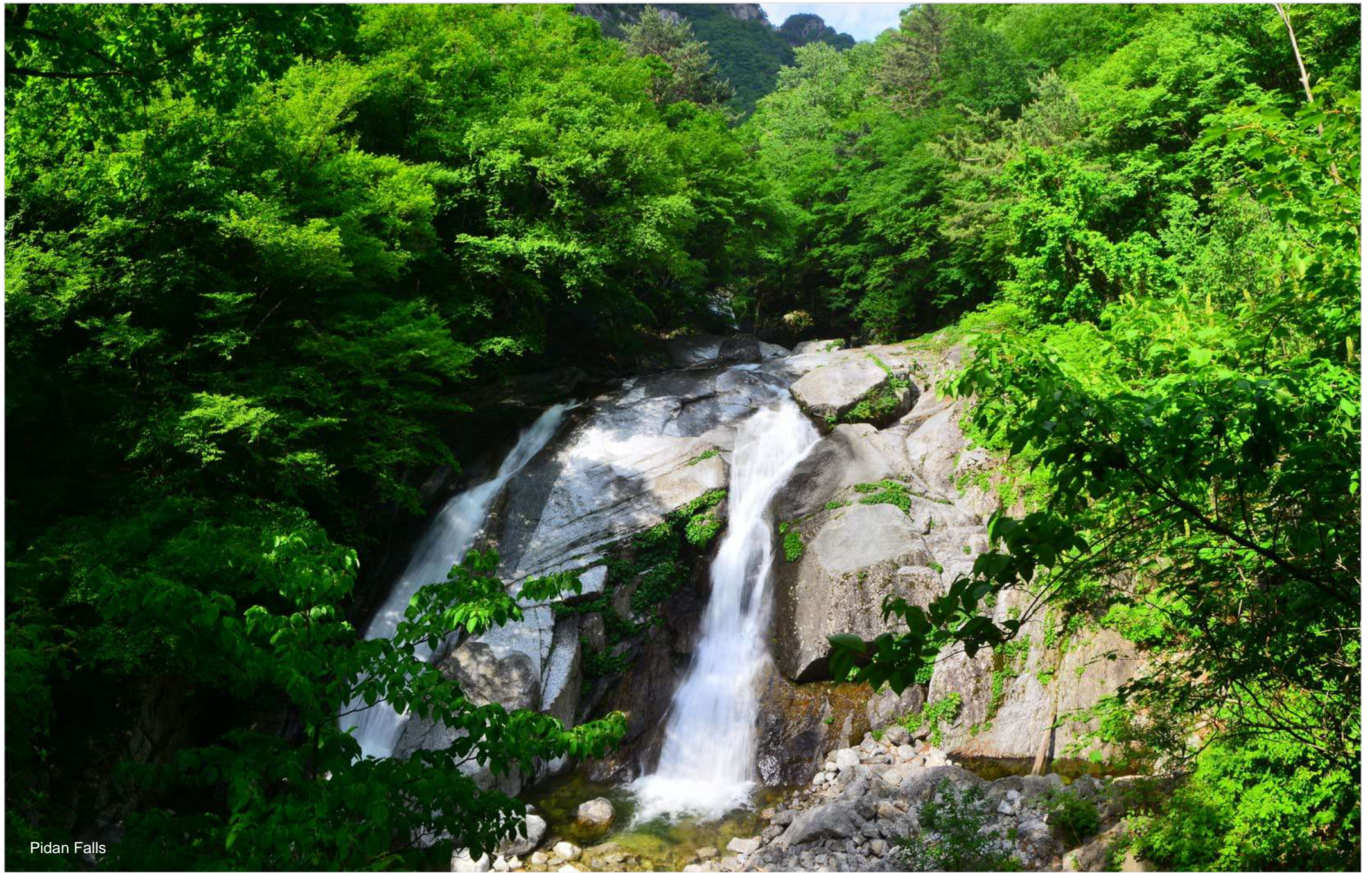

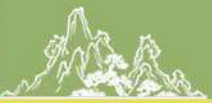

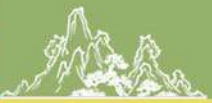

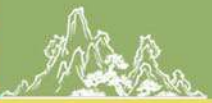

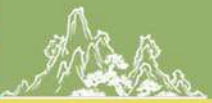
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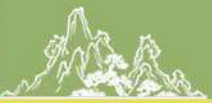

Natural monuments

Registered as a world biosphere reserve in May 2009, Mt Myohyang has such natural monuments as Myohyangsan pine, Myohyangsan *Rhododendron yedoense* community, Myohyangsan ash tree, Sangwonam gingko, Myohyangsan *Eurystomus orientalis* and Myohyangsan *Pteromys volans*.

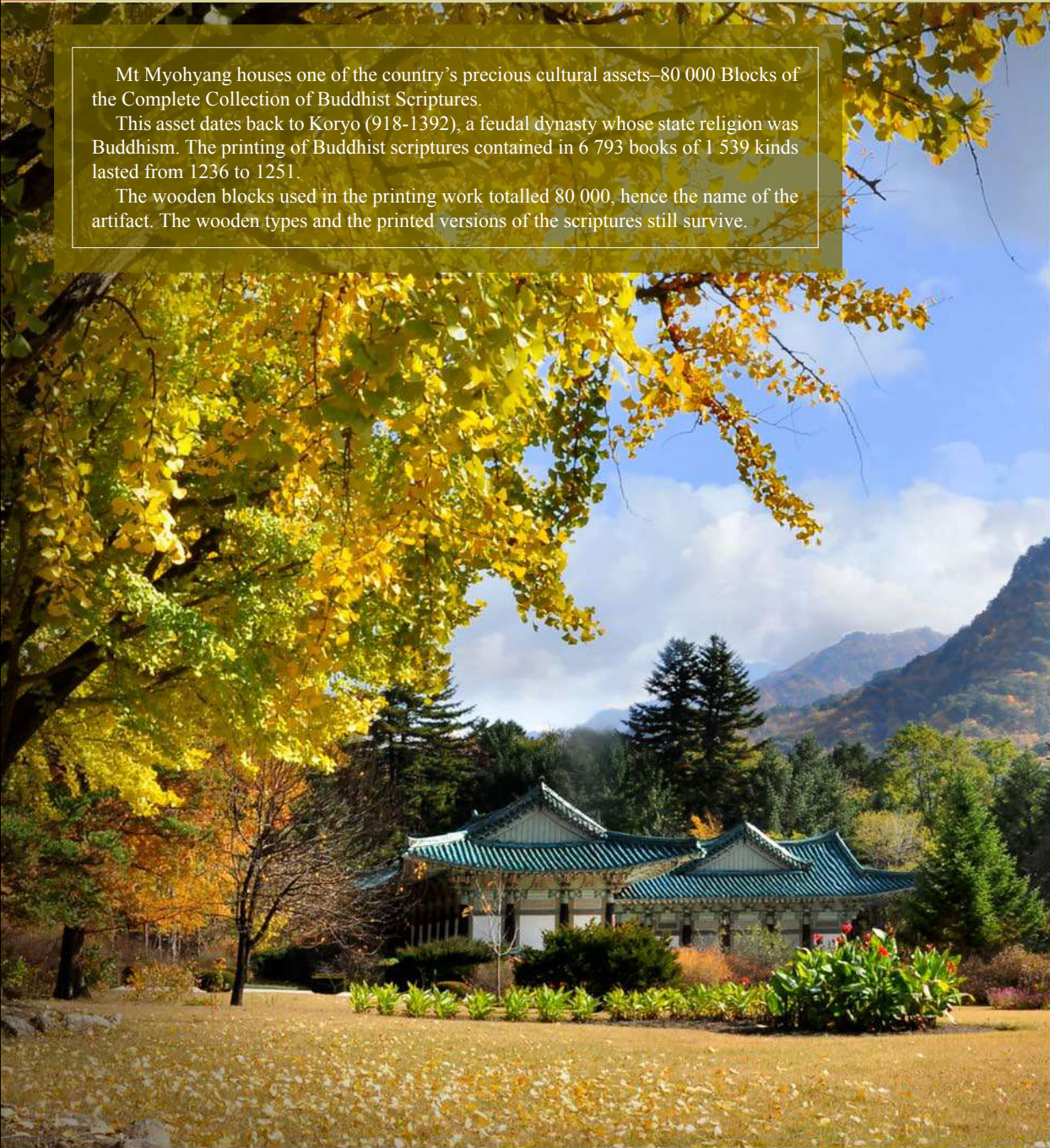


Storehouse for Complete Collection of Buddhist Scriptures and the 80 000 blocks used to print it

Mt Myohyang houses one of the country's precious cultural assets—80 000 Blocks of the Complete Collection of Buddhist Scriptures.

This asset dates back to Koryo (918-1392), a feudal dynasty whose state religion was Buddhism. The printing of Buddhist scriptures contained in 6 793 books of 1 539 kinds lasted from 1236 to 1251.

The wooden blocks used in the printing work totalled 80 000, hence the name of the artifact. The wooden types and the printed versions of the scriptures still survive.



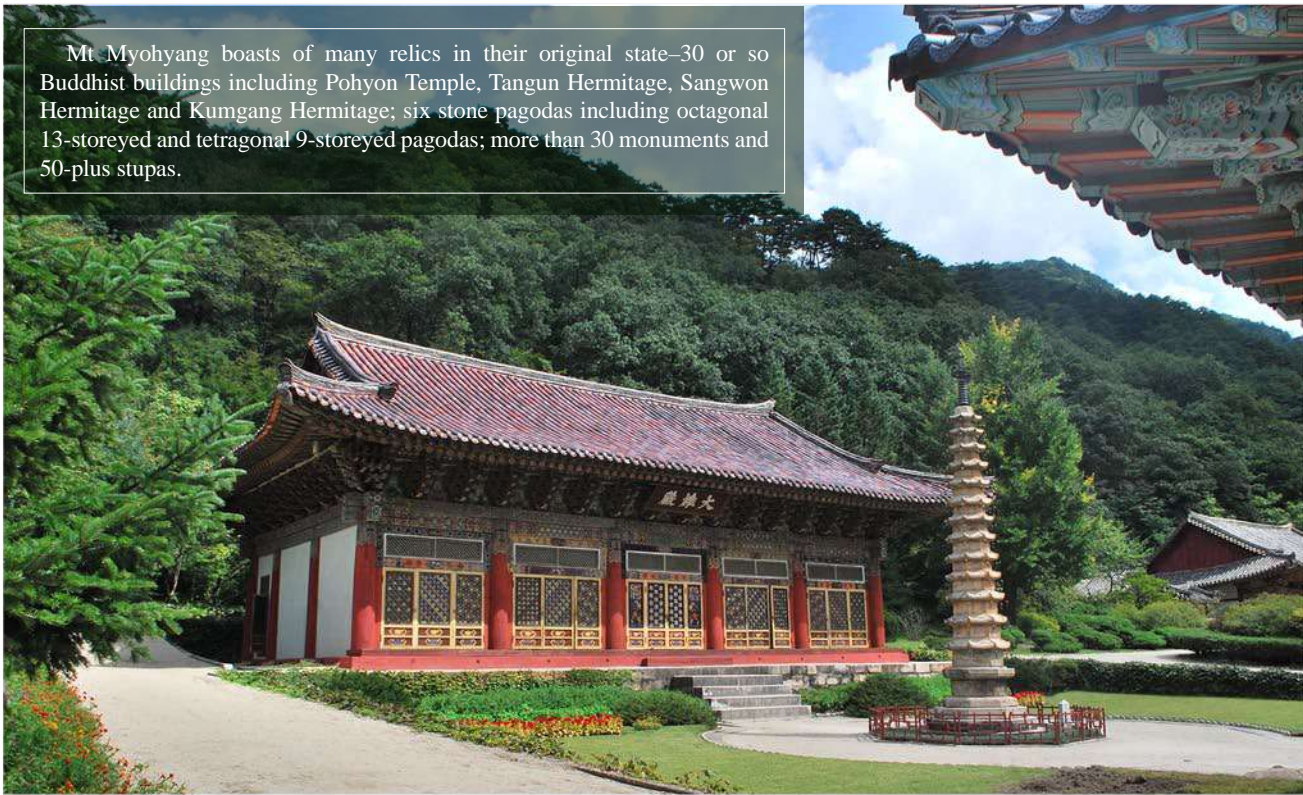
Parts of Complete Collection of Buddhist Scriptures and the 80 000 blocks used to print it





Historical relics

Mt Myohyang boasts of many relics in their original state—30 or so Buddhist buildings including Pohyon Temple, Tangun Hermitage, Sangwon Hermitage and Kumgang Hermitage; six stone pagodas including octagonal 13-storeyed and tetragonal 9-storeyed pagodas; more than 30 monuments and 50-plus stupas.

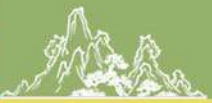

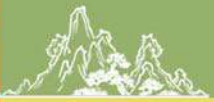


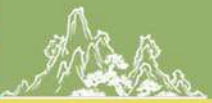
The International Friendship Exhibition House is a Korean-style building with a blue-tile roof, which goes well with the picturesque scenery of Mt Myohyang.
